

The municipal council requested an in-depth analysis of the state of Pontbriand Lake's health, in order to track its evolution. The results of the study will guide the development of an action plan aimed at mitigating the current and potential sources of lake water degradation: sediments, shoreline erosion, navigation that causes oversized waves, algae, cesspools, all within the context of climate change.

At the same time, we invite you to add a little "blush" to your landscaping to take part in the 2022 Year of the Garden celebrations. Across Canada, the goal is to add a little red to gardens. From parks to playgrounds, to front yards, simply plant a little bit of red with flowers, fruits, shrubs and vegetables.

Regulatory Reform

Most of the new regulations concerning site planning and architectural integration (PIIA) have recently come into effect. You can consult the administrative version of these regulations on the municipality's website at rawdon.ca/ Citizens/Regulations. Amendments to certain by-laws, including Zoning By-law 2021-02, are still in progress to ensure their compliance with the Matawinie RCM's Revised Land Use and Development Plan (SADR).

Dog Owners

Don't forget to purchase your dog tags at either one of Rawdon's two pet stores or from a Lanaudière Basses-Laurentides SPCA representative, who will be going door-to-door. The tag is valid (and mandatory) from January 1st to December 31st and costs \$25.

ROAD NETWORK NEWS MAINTENANCE AND SAFETY

Just like every summer, the Municipality of Rawdon will undertake various projects. Please note that you will be able to follow the progress of all the work on our website at rawdon.ca.

Guard rails will be installed on the following streets:

For added safety, permanent speed bumps will be added to:

New STOP signs will be installed at:

- The intersection of Lakeshore Drive and des Cardinaux St., in both directions, from May 1st to October 31st of each year.
- The intersection of Route 337 and Lac-aux-Sources Rd.
- The intersection of Vincent-Massey Rd. and Marie-Pier St., in both directions.




AQUEDUCT NETWORK MAINTENANCE

Towards the end of April, you will receive a notice regarding the flushing of the aqueduct network that will take place from May $1^{\rm st}$ to $7^{\rm th}$. The inspection of fire hydrants will follow, from May $9^{\rm th}$ to $13^{\rm th}$.

These rinsing and maintenance operations could lead to a slight decrease in pressure and a brownish color to the water. In this case, simply let the water run until it becomes clear again.

Reminder

The process of installing water meters began in 2018 with the IBIs (Industries/Businesses/Institutions). Volumetric pricing for the IBI sectors will come into effect in 2023. For information purposes only, the managers of these establishments will receive a mock bill to inform them of their billable water consumption.



SEWER NETWORK MAINTENANCE

The flushing of the sewer network will take place this spring. We take this opportunity to remind you that it is recommended to verify and maintain your double check valve at least once a year to avoid any backflow problems.

Please note that we are currently planning major work at the wastewater treatment plant to be undertaken within the next few years.

WHEN IT COMES TO FIRE SAFETY, PREVENTION IS STILL THE KEY!

Beginning on May 1st, Rawdon's firefighters will undertake home visits to assist you in inspecting your home from a fire prevention point of view. In 2022, the targeted sectors are located in the northern part of the municipality, near Route 125 and around Pontbriand Lake.

DO I NEED A PERMIT TO BURN?

To light a fire outdoors, no larger than one meter, by one meter and no higher than one meter, you must obtain a permit. Find out about open fire regulations by contacting the Town Hall staff at 450 834-2596 or info@rawdon.ca.



What can I put into the brown bin?

BROWN BIN REPORT YEAR 2021

Did you know that about half of the waste produced in a household is compostable? Yet, in Rawdon, according to the 2021 residual waste report, only 17% of compostable waste is put into the brown bin.

A small reminder is in order to avoid burying these materials unnecessarily in landfill sites!

Go ahead, dare to put your table scraps into the brown bin (not only yard waste)!

Kitchen waste



- Leftover food, raw, cooked, frozen
- Fruits and vegetables (whole, skins, pieces)
- Meat/poultry and bones in small quantities
- · Fish, seafood
- Flour, bread, pasta, rice, pastries
- · Solid milk products
- Spices, condiments, herbs
- Chips, sweets and nuts
- Coffee (beans, grinds or filters), tea bags
- Egg shells, seafood shells

Soiled paper and cardboard



- Paper and cardboard soiled with food (ex. pizza boxes, paper plates)
- Hand towels, paper towels and tissue

Garden waste



- · Dead leaves
- Plants, hedge cuttings, weeds
- · Cold ashes
- Wood chips
- Grass (ecological solution is to mulch: leave grass clippings on the lawn)

Unfortunately, there was a small error on the calendar: the collection of green waste will begin on May 2nd, 2022. Please make sure that your bags are at the curb by this date! Don't forget that only transparent, orange or paper bags are accepted.

A REMINDER OF GOOD PRACTICES REGARDING BUILDING MATERIALS

Did you know that building materials from construction, renovation and demolition projects cannot be disposed of along with household waste? Indeed, they must be brought to the Ecocentre. We have several containers for sorting materials for recovery: wood, metals, shingles, concrete.

The first 3 cubic yards of residential building materials are free of charge! Take advantage of it and, at the same time, why not bring us your large boxes, branches, tires and refrigeration appliances? They will be recycled!



I SAFEGUARD MY POOL, IT IS MY RESPONSIBILITY

Are you planning to install a pool? A permit is required; apply online!

We also strongly suggest that you read the new provisions in the provincial regulation on residential swimming pools, that took effect on July 1st 2021.

The end of acquired rights for swimming pools installed before November 1st, 2010.

Considering the costs associated with the installation of protective measures or an enclosure, particularly when it comes to inground and semi in-ground pools, owners have been granted a two-year period to bring their yard up to standard, by no later than July 1st 2023.







There are also new rules for pools installed since July 1st 2021, particularly with regard to the diving board and controlling access to the pool.
